9. Criteria for admission to the programme

- A first degree at higher second class honours classification or above (i.e. 2:1 or above). Exceptionally, applicants may be admitted with a 2:2, if they have strong, relevant experience of work in the social care sector.
- GCSE Grade C/4 or above in English and Maths or certificated equivalences.
- Relevant paid or voluntary work experience of at least three months.
- Applicants whose first language is not English must meet communication and comprehension skills to International English Language Testing System (IELTS) with a score of 7 (with 6.5 in all elements).
- Successful performance in an individual interview.
- An assessment of the applicant's suitability and fitness for practice through completion of a self-declaration, appropriate references, a satisfactory check on their criminal record and background including the safeguarding register; Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) and any further information gathering as indicated via other professionals or further interview and assessment.
- RPL is not permitted for admission to this programme.


